When I wrote the book *The Right T-Shirt – Write Your Own Rules and Live the Life You Want,* I had an accountability buddy. We would speak every week and support each other in our respective goals. At the end of each call we would commit to what we wanted to achieve in the next week. You can do that with whatever things you wish to achieve in your life.

You will find that once you are a way down the path there will be a point that you are so committed to your goal, that it has become strong within you, it has grown from a tender shoot to a strong bamboo that bends with the wind. It is then you can tell your goals and dreams to whomever you want and nothing will put you off.

By nurturing your goal until it gets to this place of clarity and passion you will be giving yourself the best possible chance of success and nothing will hold you back.
